Headteacher News Welcome back everyone. I sincerely hope you all had an enjoyable Easter. There's just a couple

of completely separate items I wanted to let you know about this week. The first is news about

some visitors from Ghana and the second is to explain a recent addition to the way we respond

On Monday (24th April) we will be receiving some secondary school aged visitors from Ghana.

They will be visiting us in the afternoon to spend an hour with one of our classes to lead a

drumming session and possibly do a little dancing too. The Ghanaians arrive in England today,

for one week, with a very busy itinerary. The connection comes through Plymouth High School

for Girls (PHSG) who formed a very successful, 13 year ongoing partnership with Ahantaman

Girls Senior High School in Sekondi-Takoradi, Ghana. Every two years, the schools have an

exchange of both staff and students, where a common curriculum project is followed. These

projects have varied from mathematics, to renewable energy and IT, to health and well-being.

When PHSG are visited by staff and pupils from Ghana, they try to get them involved with as

many students as possible but also aim to raise awareness in the wider community of the link

between Plymouth and Ghana, and how the two very different cultures and communities can

help each other - hence our visit. Over time, PHSG has collected and donated items to the

Ahantaman School to improve the education of the students: their unused computers have set up two computer rooms for the school, sports equipment for the PE department, a wind

turbine to help generate electricity, even items as basic as pencils and rulers. The Girls School

has a primary school close by (see photos below taken on PHSG's last visit) which is also crying

out for educational resources (reading books, simple games, matching cards, jigsaws, etc.). We

felt it would be nice if we could support the primary school in the same way that PHSG supports

the senior school. Therefore, we'd like to ask for donations of unwanted games, books or toys

which PHSG could collect from us and then arrange to be shipped to Ghana for their use. If you're happy to, please you could start hunting around for any unwanted or unused items at

'Beat the Green'

You probably already know that when we mark children's learning, we highlight the successful parts with a pink pen so they are very clear on where they've done well and succeeded, and we use a green pen to denote the areas where they need to develop. We've then recently split the greens into two broad categories; 'learning greens' and 'lazy greens'. All children will make mistakes because they're still learning new things and some learning they attempt will be challenging and tricky. This is good and we encourage them to give it a go and don't worry about making mistakes, because making mistakes and improving on those mistakes is how we all learn. These are learning greens. But then we have those mistakes that they just shouldn't be making. Things that they know, that they've proved they can do consistently but then they let them slip back into their work, perhaps because they're not concentrating enough, perhaps because they were being distracted, it can be for any number of reasons. These are what we term 'lazy greens' because the children can and should be avoiding those mistakes. We set high expectations in terms of pride in their work and avoiding common errors and we've found the reference to lazy greens is something the children can all understand and are keen to avoid. It really does seem to work and the children now relish the challenge to Beat the Green. We're very clear with the children that it's not a matter of laziness in terms of 'not bothering or not caring' but more in terms of letting our focus or concentration slip. We found that our Beat the Green approach is a very effective way of the children recognising and understanding these mistakes and being keen to improve and avoid them in the future.

Re: Mixing Class Groups

Although the following change does not affect everyone this year, we felt it was important that all parents are made aware of a new approach we will be taking from now onwards.

Montpelier is a three-form entry primary school which means we normally have three classes in each year group. Our Published Admission Number is 90 pupils which we split into those three classes. Initially, we use information from our feeder nurseries, pre-schools, child-minders and parents to place children into class M, P and S. When we compile the classes, we make every effort to have a balance of the characteristics that are proven to impact upon academic achievement, such as: gender, ability, social background, language acquisition, absence levels, behaviour, date of birth and special educational need. The intention behind balancing the classes in this way, is to create a fair and equitable mix of children in each of the three classes. The learning environment is thereby as near as identical in each classroom as we can make it, with the same mixture of provision and support required for all pupils.

However, we're always very conscious that, although we do receive information about each child before they join us, we don't actually know them very well when they first start at Montpelier. We get to know them as individuals far better in those first few days, weeks and months. What we have found is that, had we known them better at the start of the Foundation Stage, we would certainly have put the classes together differently to create this balance of pupil capability and need. We therefore are proposing to do just this. From now onwards, at the end of their Foundation Stage year with us, we will review the three classes and create three new class mixes for the start of Year 1.

Furthermore, as the children get older, they develop very differently academically, and as individuals. Also, due to pupils leaving and joining throughout the years, a class make-up can change quite significantly over time. **We are therefore also going to review the three classes at the end of Year 2 and the end of Year 4, with the intention of adjusting their composition as well.** We may feel that, following the review, *no adjustment to the classes is necessary*, but it may potentially mean moving a handful of children (discussions and explanations would take place with parents and children if this were the case) OR it may mean completely changing the make-up of the three classes as at the end of the Foundation Stage. So it might be that there was 1) no change at all, 2) a change of a few children or, 3) a complete change to all three classes.

We appreciate that, with any adjustment like this, there are disadvantages as well as benefits. The most obvious being that, if a pupil is very settled in their current class, why change it? They are with their friends at the moment - how will they feel if they are separated? However, we currently have classes where we have a disproportionate number of pupils who need support with their learning, compared to the other two classes in the year group. Also, there are classes who have a larger number of higher-performing pupils. There are also those where we have a greater proportion of pupils requiring support with either their behaviour or their social and emotional needs. This creates an unfair imbalance between the three classes which we feel we must resolve in order that all pupils continue to have an equality of opportunity to learn. Classes do, of course, receive different levels of support in response to their make-up (for example, in terms of additional adults) but, despite this, it does give those classes a different overall feel, and this is something we can change.

We will of course inform parents and children regarding the changes at the earliest possible opportunity. This is most likely to be late June or early July - just as soon as we've finalised staff deployment for the next academic year.
