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Headteacher News

A Broad and Balanced Curriculum

I recently met with all the key people who will be involved in leading the Inspiring Schools Partnership (the Multi Academy Trust of which we are a member). During that meeting, I showed everyone the film that appears on the Homepage of our school website to give them a really good idea of what Montpelier is all about. If you've not watched it, it's worth spending three and half minutes on! The short film is merely a collection of photos that were taken during just one term at school. Not contrived or manufactured; Miss Spragg literally went through our 'Media' drive and pulled out a selection of photos, at random, taken by our staff and then put a caption to each one. What that did was to produce a snapshot into childrens' learning experiences at our school over a thirteen week period. It makes for some heartening viewing. What I told the Members and Trustees at the Inspiring Schools Partnership meeting was that we absolutely pride ourselves on our happy learning environment and that it's founded upon enjoyment of learning, and a broad and balanced curriculum. And whilst I don't think that anyone would argue that the mastery of English and maths is not crucial, as they are both key to the wider world of learning, we do believe that a narrow concentration on these can be unhealthy.

At Montpelier, we believe that a broad and balanced curriculum promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils and prepares them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life. The current accountability regime driven by successive governments has led many schools to provide a curriculum that is distorted or restricted by the external pressures of testing and accountability, as the diet of English and maths is increased at the expense of other subject areas. But why am I telling you this? Well, whilst we highly value the need for children to be both literate and numerate, I wish to reassure parents that this won't come at the expense of developing their knowledge and understanding of the very world we live in, the environment, different religions/cultures, a foreign language, technology, computing, music and the creative arts. We will continue to ensure that they participate fully in sports and physical activity; that they engage in high quality PSHE; that they develop positive character traits including resilience, communication, teamwork, problem solving and empathy; and also develop positive attributes including high self-esteem, positive emotional and mental health, tolerance, managing risk, respect and ambition. Whilst good English and maths test outcomes are very important for children and for schools, we will continue to educate your children to be well-rounded individuals with a diverse skill-set that will empower them as they move on in the world. Perhaps this is all a bit 'heavy' for a Friday afternoon newsletter but it speaks of our passion to do what's best for your children.

Pokémon and Match Attax Cards.

Collectable trading cards come and go in popularity but it seems that an enthusiasm has been rekindled for both Pokémon and Match Attax cards. I certainly don't wish to ban children having these in school but we have had a few issues during this week. Cards, like any personal belongings in school, can go missing from time to time either misplaced, lost, stolen, damaged, or spoiled in some way. Our stance is that trading cards are brought into school at the children's own risk. Parents need to be aware that staff cannot waste precious time pursuing cards that go missing. It is almost impossible to identify which cards belong to which child unless they're named (and naming cards somewhat defeats the potential for trading them). Certainly though tins or collector's books, albums or cases could be labelled. I would recommend that children don't bring in large collections or rare/expensive items as we just cannot guarantee they're safety. Bringing in a few cards that they may wish to show friends, or trade at break or lunch times, would be most sensible. I hope you can appreciate, understand and support us by encouraging this. Thank you.

School Games Cross Country Staddiscombe

The annual Plymouth School Sports Partnership Cross Country got underway on the 20th October at Staddiscombe, in an unusual dry and sunny conditions.

With eight races in total the 1000 plus runners arrived ready to take on the challenging course. Montpelier was fortunate enough to enter in all 'Major' categories. First up was the year 3 and 4 girls finishing in 9th position with 140 points. Next was the boys, knowing what to expect went 1 better than the girls in 8th position with 132 points. The year 5 and 6 boys finished in 13th place with 215 points against a very strong field. The year 5 and 6 girls had a lot to live up to, with winning the league a week earlier this was their moment to shine, and shine they did. With 19 schools and almost 100 runners entered into this event, our girls knew this was going to be difficult, yet again they proved why they are the best School Cross Country Team. Five of the girls finishing in the top 19, winning the event with an incredible 33 points, believed to be the first time ever for our school. Congratulations to all of you, you were all amazing. Thank you to the parents who transported their child and for the continued support and encouragement.
