Head teacher News

I always try to remain uncontentious and apolitical in my Headteacher news but this week I wish to talk SATs, which is always guaranteed to be emotive whether you're a pupil, parent or teacher. Successive governments have told us that 'it's what parents want' although I've rarely found this to be the case, and certainly the recent 'Let Our Kids Be Kids' campaign, started by a group of parents who have 'had enough of endless testing, enough of teachers not being trusted to teach, enough of an Ofsted driven, dull, dry curriculum aimed solely at passing National Curriculum tests', echoes the sentiments of many. They also tell us that teachers need the SATs to tell them what children can do. I can categorically tell you that teachers do not need these narrow tests for this; our ongoing informal assessments provide a far more in-depth and rounded evaluation of each pupil's capabilities.

Last week, we were visited by someone from the Schools and Settings team at Plymouth City Council to check that all of our SATs papers were being kept under lock and key and that none had been opened by us prematurely. The implicit message here is, of course, that we may be cheating – opening the tests early and teaching the children the content. As principled professionals this is nothing short of utterly offensive. Needless to say, they found the papers locked away in the cupboards in my office and every pack of papers remained sealed. Little apology for the implied insult before they moved on to the next school. At this point, some will chorus that schools have occasionally been found actually cheating. When I hear of this, I'm not sure whether to be more disappointed in the colleagues who have been driven to such measures, or in the absurdly high-stakes, pressured system of accountability that we have found ourselves in that makes these people even consider doing such a thing.

Our Year 6 children performed admirably though this week. These new test papers, which are considerably more difficult than in previous years, undoubtedly caused varying degrees of stress and upset for pupils. We always try to minimise this as much as possible but these tests have now become notorious in their own right and, whatever we say to the children, they definitely feel an unwarranted degree of pressure to 'perform'. This early experience of staring at countless questions that seem to test more about what they don't know rather than what they do know, has not been a worthwhile educational experience for them. Many schools sent letters out to parents and pupils prior to the SATs telling them that these tests do not assess all of what makes each child special and unique, and go on to talk about all the other amazing things that children can do. Such letters contain important messages. Being well-rounded individuals is much more than being able to answer abstract mathematical problems or questions that pick apart the beautiful art of writing into an almost mechanical process of understanding and applying fronted adverbials, intransitive verbs, possessive determiners and the like.

Education policy has undoubtedly lost its way at the moment - it's adrift in a purposeless sea of political accountability. I wish to reassure every one of our pupils and parents that we will continue to navigate our way through this with your interests at the centre of all we do. We achieve this by providing a truly broad and balanced experience for children that engenders a love and joy of learning and a desire to be the best that each of them can be in their own special and unique way. Well done to all of Year 6; we think you're fabulous. Regardless of any score you receive, if you've tried your best, that's all we can ask of anyone.

Foundation News
