It is with pride that I bring you the next piece of news, I have no doubt that many of you will already be aware that two of our children, Nuala Eyres in Class 1S and Amy Weaver in class 2S (and forgive me if there are others that I am not aware of), have selflessly donated their hair in recent weeks to The Little Princess Charity. The charity provide real hair wigs, free of charge, to boys and girls across the UK and Ireland that have lost their own hair through cancer treatment. Their mission is to supply real hair wigs to children suffering with cancer, for the duration of their treatment. However, in addition they assist children with other conditions which also result in hair loss, the most common being alopecia. They work with specialist suppliers and experienced hairdressers who offer wigs tailored to the individual child's needs to give the most realistic look and feel, as close as possible to their original hair. The girls raised an incredible amount of money for this amazing charity.

Nuala has raised over £500 and that total will only rise as her sponsorship continues to come in. When a close family friend was diagnosed with Leukaemia, Amy wanted to help and that is exactly was she has did, having raised over £1,050, cutting off over 10 inches of her hair.

Both families are extremely proud of the selfless act and determination of both girls to help others and that pride, I am sure, will be shared by many others. Dear Pupils, Parent and Carers,

Following a number of hoax bomb calls to schools across the UK this letter provides an update to pupils, their parents and carers. Each call has caused significant disruption to school life, upset to school staff and concern to pupils, their parents and carers.

The police treat calls threatening bomb attacks very seriously and are committed to working with schools to ensure the safety of all students and to minimise disruption to their learning. The following action is or is being taken:

- Every bomb threat will be assessed. Highly experienced officers review intelligence and work with counter-terrorism experts, who have an in depth knowledge of incidents of this nature, to assess whether a threat is real or not. So far, there has been no credible threat posed to pupil safety and all the calls have been malicious designed to cause fear and disruption.
- Police are conducting a major criminal investigation. Making a hoax bomb threat is a serious crime punishable by up to seven years imprisonment. Police forces across the country are working together to find those responsible and a number of arrests have already been made.
- Police have refreshed guidance with the Department for Education to share with leaders of schools, other education establishments, and authorities. This guidance also signposts to advice on wider security reviews and supports existing safeguarding plans. Public guidance on how you, schools and the council can prepare for emergencies can be found at: www.gov.uk/local-planning-emergency-major-incident.

There is a real threat from terrorism and it is important that we are alert but not alarmed. Schools remain some of the safest and most secure public spaces; the wellbeing of pupils is the top priority of staff.

To help us we ask the following of you:-

- If the school makes a decision to temporarily suspend lessons while safety checks are carried out, do
 not attend to remove your child unless asked to do so. Schools will keep you informed and always
 arrange care for pupils unable to return home or whose parents/carers are unable to collect them.
 Do not phone the emergency services to ask for updates on your child as it delays genuine people in
 need from getting help.
- If you have any information about those responsible for the security alerts call police on 101 (999 in an emergency) or the independent charity Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.
