

## Headteacher News

It's nearly Christmas. It's that special time of year. Children are becoming excited and parents are making preparations. Interestingly though, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev Justin Welby, chose this time to express his concern over the pressure to spend at Christmas and how this puts families under too much strain. He stated that *'It puts pressure on relationships because when you're short of money you argue. You get cross with your kids more easily, it spoils life.'* He suggests that the 'absurd and ridiculous pressure' to have a perfect Christmas puts relationships under strain, that consumerism over the festive period is now so 'over the top' that couples are left arguing over money and children are shouted at. He said that he would like to tell people to stop giving gifts altogether but accepts no one would listen. Instead, he urged families to show love and affection rather than trying to buy it. Figures last year suggested the average household spent around £1,000 on Christmas. He attempted to bring people back to the origin of the Christian celebration - God giving his only son, Jesus Christ. He stated that giving at Christmas is meant to reflect that generosity of God and for us to be generous in a way that *shows* love and affection rather than *buys* love and affection. His advice was to *'Share love and affection with reasonable gifts that demonstrate you really care for someone. That makes for the best Christmas you could ever have.'* Very sensible words!

The true reason why Christians celebrate Christmas is a message we always communicate to children at this time. I really appreciate the pressures upon parents to purchase the next newest and best thing for their children. However, I would always advise restraint and take comfort from the words of children because, deep down, they do know what it's all about. I remembered reading an old CBBC Newsround Blog. They invited children to comment on 'What does Christmas mean to you?' I managed to find that forum and have copied a handful of the remarks from it that reflect the overall messages communicated by all the children who posted comments.

*"I think that Christmas is more giving than getting and **being around people who love you and who you love.**"* Melissa (9)

*"I think Christmas is about **love**, being kind and respectful to other people."* Leila (10).

*"I think Christmas is a time for **getting together with your friends and family** and remembering why we celebrate December the 25<sup>th</sup>. I do like to enjoy opening presents and having a delicious meal, but some people forget what the meaning of Christmas is."* Fleur (10).

*"The true meaning of Christmas is the birth of Jesus but Christmas to me means everybody is happy and you **spend more time with your family.**"* Mollie (11).

*"Nowadays, most children think that Christmas is just a time where their parents give them presents and forget that it's really a religious festival. But even though I'm not religious, for me Christmas is a time where people can relax, **share** and have fun."* Leila (12).

*"I think that not only is Christmas about **being with family** but it is a time for giving and not only to your family and friends but to the less fortunate people in third world countries. Christmas is also about realising when Jesus was born and that he died for us."* Phoebe (13).

*"**Bringing all your family together**, having a laugh, giving presents and eating some delicious foods. YUM! YUM!"* Nancy (12).

What message do I draw from these children's thoughts? Well, there are common threads here. Yes, presents feature in what they say but the more powerful message to me is summed up by the words: giving, love, kindness, respect, happiness, friends, family and food. And it's the family part that really stands out for me. It resonates with the piece I wrote back in October (15 Small Things Parents Should Do To Their Children Every Day To Make Them Feel Loved') about how children really value their parents spending time with them. Something which costs nothing at all but means so much to them (their words, not mine). My message possibly comes a little late for some shoppers but it's still worth saying. For children, Christmas is very much about family and seeing more of mum and dad. Life is so busy, time spent together has become a highly prized, precious commodity. Please try to give it freely and generously this Christmas.
