Headteacher News

Golden Learning Behaviour

Towards the end of January, I introduced you to our new initiative for recognising, celebrating and encouraging excellent *learning* behaviours; the aim being to help children understand the process of learning in greater depth and to discover how to improve and become better learners. It's about studying the techniques, the skills and the abilities that children need and can develop further in order to become better at learning new things.

As I explained in Issue 17 of *The Beacon*, **Golden Learning Behaviour** is broken up into four key areas (or dispositions): the 4 R's of **Resilience**, **Resourcefulness**, **Reflectiveness** and **Reciprocity**. These four learning dispositions are further broken down into seventeen different aspects of learning (or 'learning muscles'): The children have been introduced to '**Resilient Robbie**' who **manages his distractions**, **perseveres**, becomes **absorbed** in what he is doing and is good at **noticing** things. All of these attributes make him an effective learner. We represent each of these four learning characteristics with animals to make them easier for the children to remember (see Issue 17). Next, the children were introduced to **Resourceful Rafika** who **questions** things, **makes links** in her learning, uses her **imagination**, **reasons** well and also **capitalises** well when approaching new challenges (see issue 19). All of these attributes make her a very effective learner. Again, each of these characteristics is represented by an animal: the **Questioning Quail**, the **Link-Making Lion**, the **Imagining Impala**, the **Reasoning Raccoon**, and the **Capitalising Caterpillar**. Now, over the next couple of weeks, the children will be introduced to **Reflective Rory** who is good at **planning** his learning (**Planning Platypus**); **revising** - being flexible and changing plans and how he approaches learning (**Revising Reindeer**); **distilling** – understanding what he's learnt from an experience (**Distilling Dingo**); and **meta learning** – knowing himself as a learner, knowing how he learns best, and is able to talk about the learning process (**Meta-Learning Mole**). We hope that understanding all of these processes will help our children to become the best all-round learners they can be.

Deputy Head News

Site Security - I would like to start with a small reminder about site security. At the end of the school day the only access into the school building is the main entrance – this includes access to the Library. All other exits will be locked and closely monitored by the staff at the school. The school gates will be open by our Site Manager Zak Morgan from 15.00. Please be patient and allow time for this to happen as we have six entrances across our school site. At the end of the day the children will be shown out by their teacher or teaching assistant and they will be available at this time if you wish to speak with them or indeed they need to speak with you. After each class has been dismissed the door will be closed to ensure that our schools building is secure. I ask that if you wish to enter the building at this time, you use the main entrance in the same way that you would throughout the school day. In addition the school gates will be closed from 15.45. This will give enough time for all children to leave the school site safely. I would like to thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Bikes, Scooters and Safety - I am very conscious that I may start to sound like a broken record, but I feel that a reminder of our expectations regarding the use of bikes and scooters on the school grounds is required at this time. We have noticed an increasing number of children riding around the school grounds. Safety on the school site is of paramount importance to us. We have asked, in various ways, that pupils do not ride bikes or scooters around the school grounds. We love the idea of them using bikes and scooters to come to and from school; we strongly encourage this in fact. What we MUST have though is children dismounting and walking with their bike or scooter whilst on the school playgrounds. We have had too many collisions and minor accidents due to children charging around busy playgrounds at the end of the day – only Monday this week a little was knocked off of his feet by another child. This is where I need your help. The children are under parental supervision at the end of the day. Please could you reinforce this requirement to consider everyone's safety? We can remind them, but it is almost an impossible task to check that this I happening and we would appreciate your support with making this happen.
